Gangs in Omaha

n the early 1980s, the Omaha Police Department didn't even use the term "gang activity." In spite of what both police and the media knew, the public spin was that gangs were in Minneapolis, Kansas City, Chicago – but not in Omaha.

That changed over the years, and today the Omaha Police Department's Gang Unit works seven days a week, collaborating closely with schools, the Omaha Housing Authority and uniform patrol officers – whom they consider their eyes and ears.

Two individuals who know the situation well serve as our Noon Education Forum speakers on June 19:

Lt. Ken Kanger, who is in charge of Omaha Police Department's Gang Unit and has 21 years of law enforcement experience, and Janee Pannkuk, executive director of Impact One.

OPC Hero: Gary Kerr

n 1999, then-OPC President Bill Kelly asked Gary Kerr to chair an Education Committee that would plan monthly Noon Education Forums.

Kerr liked the idea of a continuing program to educate members and the

general public. "We're a press club, and the Omaha Press Club should be doing things like this."

That was 15 years ago, and the committee is still going strong. "We think about ideas not only Press Club members would be interested in, but the general public," Kerr said

"Things I think will work often don't. And things I look at and say 'Nobody is coming to this,' we get a full house for," Kerr said with a laugh.

Sometimes there are surprises. "One time we really filled the club was when we had Nebraska poet Ted Kooser, who was then the U.S. Poet Laureate," Kerr said. He felt the Pulitzer Prize-winning poet was an important speaker, but didn't expect the turnout he received.

"But I'm a news person, and so things in the news are what I look at."

People who show up at the Omaha Press Club are only part of the audience for the Noon Education Forums. KIOS Public Radio broadcasts the speeches during a noon hour a few days later.

Noon Forums that always fill the club are political debates moderated by Kerr. A Nebraska 2nd Congressional District debate is held every two years. This year's will most likely be in October. "We also

want to try to do a gubernatorial debate this year," he said.

Kerr clarifies that "we" refers to the Omaha Press Club and the League of Women Voters of Greater Omaha, who are co-sponsors. His wife, Karren, is a former national board member of the League of Women Voters and was president of the Nebraska league.

Service to the OPC

Kerr served on the OPC board of directors from 1998 to 2004. He was secretary in 1998. He was honored as a "Face on the Barroom Floor" in 2000 and was inducted into the OPC Hall of Fame in 2011.

The year he retired from WOWT, Kerr appeared on stage at the 1999 Omaha Press Club Show to recite his "Top 10 Things I Plan to Do in Retirement." It wasn't his first appearance in the show. In

the 1970s, he showed up on stage in a gorilla suit.

A farm boy from South Dakota, Kerr joined WOW-TV (now WOWT) and Radio in 1964 as assistant farm director. The first television station in Nebraska, WOW-TV then was only 15 years old. Also that year, another South Dakota country boy, Tom Brokaw, worked down

the street at KMTV.

Kerr became WOW-TV's chief newscaster in 1971. He also worked briefly at KSCJ Radio and KTIV in Sioux City.

Kerr held the record as Omaha's longest-tenured TV newscaster when he left WOWT in 1999. The veteran journalist was called the "Walter Cronkite of Omaha" and "dean of Omaha TV newscasters." The UNO School of Communication presented him a Lifetime Achievement Award.

When Kerr said goodbye to his television audience on New Year's Eve 1998, he reminisced about stories covered over 35 years: civil rights and Vietnam War protests in the 1970s. "I questioned whether the nation would survive," he said. The farm recession of the 1980s. The unbridled prosperity of the 1990s. The change in 1991 of the Strategic Air Command to Strategic Command. "A few

jobs were lost, but the devastating impact on Bellevue some had predicted never happened."

Gary and Karren Kerr have two sons, Justin in Chicago and Aaron in Minneapolis, and five grandchildren.

They spend time on the farm in South Dakota where Gary Kerr grew up to become a respected newscaster. He is one of the long-time contributors who generously give their time to make the Omaha Press Club a great place to be.

As for the summer schedule, look for the many events we have planned with college baseball in town. The opening ceremonies Fireworks Buffet -- on Friday, June 13 -- is always a great event with the unique view we have from the club. My personal favorite, though, is the Fathers' Day Grill -- on Saturday, June 14 -with a buffet format plus the bonus that you order your steak to your liking from the kitchen.

The OPC Reuben

It has been suggested that I include in my monthly column a description or history of the items that make our OPC menu special. A

good idea, I agreed, so here is my first go at it:

Omaha has a claim to fame on inventing the Reuben Sandwich, and we at the Press Club feel we have the city's best Reuben. Other area club members come to the Press Club just for our Rueben sandwich.

The old-school Rueben was prepared as follows: sauerkraut drained in a colander overnight (to prevent the sandwich from being soggy). Some chefs would mix the kraut with Thousand Island dressing, combine rye or pumpernickel bread with a slice of Swiss cheese, the sauerkraut, corned beef brisket and the Thousand Island, then grill the sandwich until hot. Many chefs would grill both sides of the bread

and then finish the sandwich in the microwave. A restaurant that served a lot of Ruebens would make multiple sandwiches ahead of time and wrap them individually, then store on a sheet pan in the walk-in cooler until needed. VILLAMONTE

> Here is how the Rueben has evolved at your club:

- · Our chefs start by buttering both slices of the bread and placing them on the grill.
- Immediately place a slice of Swiss cheese on both pieces of bread.
- Apply dressing on both slices of bread (Villamonte's Reuben Dressing can be purchased at most local Hy-Vee stores).
- Grill and brown the kraut separately to dry the excess liquid.
- Grill separately the sliced lean eyeof-the-round corned beef
- Add the corned beef to the sandwich, then the kraut on top of the beef.
- · Combine the breads and slice at a bias. Voila!
